Maundy Thursday Liturgy

Through this service we travel with Jesus as his disciples.

We will hear that Jesus washed the feet of his disciples
and then called them to do the same for others. We too will wash feet.

We will hear Jesus offering himself in bread and wine,
the feast of the Church at which all are welcome.

We too will take bread and wine, bless and share them.

Then we will go with Jesus to an abandoned garden.

We will hear him ask his disciples to stay awake with him while he prays.

We too will keep watch with him through the dark hours of the night.

A new commandment: to love as we are loved.
And what is love? Watch. Listen.
It looks like this. It dares this.
This is love...

The Gathering

At the entry of the procession a hymn is sung.

*During the hymn the three sacred oils- of the sick, of baptism
and of chrism (of confirmation and call)- are carried to the altar.*

The Greeting

A new commandment I give to you,
that you love one another, as I have loved you. *John 13.34*

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God,
and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all
and also with you.

The Introduction to the Service

The Prayers of Penitence

Our Lord Jesus Christ says:

The Preparation of the Table

At the Eucharist we are with our crucified and risen Lord.
We know that it was not only our ancestors,
but we ourselves who were redeemed and brought forth

so our Lord is here with us now.

The Eucharistic Prayer

The Lord be with you **and also with you.**

Lift up your hearts. **We lift them to the Lord.**

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.
It is right to give thanks and praise

It is indeed right to give you thanks,
Father most holy, through Jesus Christ our Lord.
For on this very night he girded himself with a towel
and, taking the form of a servant,
washed the feet of his disciples.
He gave us a new commandment
that we should love one another as he has loved us.
Knowing that his hour had come,
in his great love he gave this supper to his disciples
to be a memorial of his passion,
that we might proclaim his death until he comes again,
and feast with him in his kingdom.
Therefore earth unites with heaven
to sing a new song of praise;
we too join with angels and archangels
as they proclaim your glory without end:

**Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might,
heaven and earth are full of your glory.
Hosanna in the highest.
Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.
Hosanna in the highest.**

We praise and bless you, loving Father,
through Jesus Christ, our Lord;
and as we obey his command, send your Holy Spirit,
that broken bread and wine outpoured
may be for us the body and blood of your dear Son.

On the night before he died he had supper with his friends
and, taking bread, he praised you.
He broke the bread, gave it to them and said:
Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you;
do this in remembrance of me.

When supper was ended he took the cup of wine.
Again he praised you, gave it to them and said:
Drink this, all of you;
this is my blood of the new covenant,
which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins.
Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

So, Father, we remember all that Jesus did;
in him we plead with confidence his sacrifice
made once for all upon the cross.
Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation,
we proclaim his death and resurrection
until he comes in glory.

Christ is the bread of life:
**When we eat this bread and drink this cup,
we proclaim your death Lord Jesus
until you come in glory.**

Lord of all life, help us to work together for that day
when your kingdom comes
and justice and mercy will be seen in all the earth.

Look with favour on your people,
gather us in your loving arms
and bring us with Blessed Mary, the Mother of Jesus,
and the disciples and of all the saints to feast at your table in heaven.

Through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ,
in the unity of the Holy Spirit,
all honour and glory are yours, O loving Father,
for ever and ever.

The Lord's Prayer [Sit or kneel]

Give us this day our daily bread.

**And forgive us our trespasses,
as we forgive those who trespass against us.**

**And lead us not into temptation;
but deliver us from evil.**

**For thine is the kingdom,
the power and the glory,
for ever and ever. Amen.**

Every time we eat this bread and drink this cup,
we proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

The Agnus Dei

Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world, have mercy on us.

The Communion

Come to this table to meet the living Creator, God our Father,
Love indescribable and beyond our imagining,
yet closer than our own breath.

Come to this table to meet the living Christ,
flesh of our flesh, bone of our bone,
who rescues a fallen people through his death on the cross.

Come to this table to meet the living Spirit,
inspiring our quest for truth and justice,
breathing into us life and hope.

Come to find, to meet the living God,
whose love is ever new in bread and in wine.

This is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world.
Blessed are those who are called to his supper.

**Lord, I am not worthy to receive you,
but only say the word, and I shall be healed.**

This feast is the feast of God's people.

All those who have been baptised are invited by Jesus to receive communion here.

*It is his offer, his welcome. We are his people, made one, made equal,
through his radical love, by his amazing gift of himself.*

The body of Christ, broken for you. **Amen.**

The blood of Christ, shed for you. **Amen.**

The Prayer after Communion [Stand]

St Paul writes: Every time you eat this bread and drink this cup you
proclaim the death of our Lord, until he comes in glory. Let us pray.

May our eyes turn to look again on you, O Christ,

For you are the Way, the Truth and the Life.

Give us courage always to be loyal to the Truth,

To follow wherever the Way may lead, costly though it be,

Trusting that the goal is none other than Life with you. **Amen.**

**Lord Jesus Christ, you have taught us that what we do
for the least of our brothers and sisters we do also for you:**

give us the will to be the servant of others

as you were the servant of all,

and gave up your life and died for us,

but are alive and reign, now and for ever. Amen.

The Dismissal

When the disciples had sung a hymn,
they went out to the Mount of Olives.

Jesus prayed: "Abba Father, if it be possible,
take this cup of suffering from me."

Jesus grieved that his disciples were not able
to stay awake with him one hour.

There he was betrayed by the kiss of a friend.

He was handed over to the authorities
who had longed long for this moment.

They took him in chains to a secure place.

Jesus was obedient even unto death.

The Procession to the Altar of Repose

*We stand to sing the hymn. We kneel as the Blessed Sacrament passes by
and then remain sitting or kneeling for the rest of the hymn. Then we sing:*

Tantum Ergo

Therefore we, before him bending,
this great Sacrament revere;
types and shadows have their ending,
for the newer rite is here;
faith, our outward sense befriending,
makes our inward vision clear.

Glory let us give, and blessing
to the Father and the Son,
honour, might and praise addressing,
while eternal ages run;
ever too his love confessing,
who from Both with Both is One.

The Stripping of the Sanctuary

As the altars are stripped the choir sing Psalm 22.

*Please make your way quietly to the Altar of Repose to Keep Watch,
or leave in silence. You are welcome to return later,
at some time before Midnight, to Keep Watch.*



Psalm 22 (NRSV translation)

My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?

Why are you so far from helping me, from the words of my groaning?

O my God, I cry by day, but you do not answer; and by night, but find no rest.

Yet you are holy, enthroned on the praises of Israel.

In you our ancestors trusted; they trusted, and you delivered them.

To you they cried, and were saved; in you they trusted, and were not put to shame.

But I am a worm, and not human; scorned by others, and despised by the people.

All who see me mock at me; they make mouths at me, they shake their heads;

“Commit your cause to the LORD; let him deliver—

let him rescue the one in whom he delights!”

Yet it was you who took me from the womb;

you kept me safe on my mother’s breast.

On you I was cast from my birth,

and since my mother bore me you have been my God.

Do not be far from me, for trouble is near and there is no one to help.
