

Change of Ministry at Woosehill Church

We are starting to look at the replacement for Soba when he leaves in August, which, under the current

alternating ministry will be an Anglican minister. The Parish Share for a full time Anglican minister works out at approximately £65,000 per year, plus 10% to the Methodist circuit. Unfortunately, our budget will only stretch to about £45,000, which is the equivalent to about half a minister, even though it's about 70% of the cost of a full minister!

For Paddy and Patrick, St Paul's were able to provide the shortfall and a full time minister was employed (albeit we nominally only had 70% of their time). Currently St Paul's are unable to contribute any funding to our new minister and therefore we are limited to the half a minister we can afford. Note: in terms of Sunday services the half an Anglican minister would take 3 Sundays a month, and the 4th Sunday would be Methodist lead, so half a minister should not be too much of an issue to us.

To employ half a minister, we need the Archdeacon to put the necessary procedures in place and obtain the necessary permissions. The church council has formally agreed for this to go ahead.

The Circuit

As Soba and Catherine Bowstead retire, Revd Wes Hampton has been invited to join the circuit as a presbyter. He will have Pastoral Charge of Wokingham Methodist Church, and share Pastoral Charge at the Church@ThePines and Woosehill Church (with our Anglican minister) commencing on the 1st September 2025.

Wes and his wife, Cherry, will move into the manse in Wokingham in August 2025.

The current Berkshire and Surrey Borders circuit is to join with the Hampshire Surrey Borders circuit.

Please pray for our church during this time of change, for the new incumbents and for Soba and Catherine as they move on.

Same-sex blessing

The need for opening our church for same-sex blessing has been tabled at the Church Council meetings a few times. We are an ecumenical partnership between the Methodist and Anglican churches. Our decisions on major issues are bound by what is commonly approved and held by the two churches.



Obviously, the Methodist Church has approved same-sex marriages and as a result of that, same-sex blessing is allowed. The Anglican Church has not decided on same-sex marriages yet, but same-sex blessing is allowed. Therefore, we are not restricted in going forward with same-sex blessing in our church.

But there are some procedures involved. Going by the Methodist route, the following steps need to be taken:

Expression of interest: there must be sufficient expression of interest from church members. This leads to the next step.

A general conversation involving all church members: A booklet produced by the Methodist Church, *God in Love Unites Us* which provides a theological outline on same-sex marriage, will be distributed to members. After giving adequate time for members to read, reflect and pray about the concept of marriage/same-sex marriage, a general meeting to be convened to discuss the views of church members. If the majority of members are in favour of this, the next step will be:

Church Council: A meeting of the church council will finally decide whether to go forward with same-sex blessings.

Therefore, I invite you to write to me or speak to me directly when you see me at church, if you would like to see same-sex blessings to be allowed at Woosehill church.

Can you hear me?

One of the challenges for the audio-visual team is that of ensuring the sound quality is good for both those in the church and for the "home" congregation. Here is how you can help.

Firstly, if you are reading or doing intercessions from the lectern, please make sure that the microphone is adjusted at the right height for you, that is close to your mouth. Remember the volume of sound going into the microphone falls off with the square of the distance between it and you. That is if you move twice as far away, the microphone captures a quarter of the sound intensity. The microphone at the lectern is on a flexible stalk and so can be directed in a way that allows you to speak comfortably and most importantly clearly. There were a couple of demonstrations of how this could be achieved at the carol service.

If you are uncomfortable with doing this, we can always provide you with a clip on radio microphone, if you ask before the service starts.

You might ask can't we just turn the volume up and in some cases we do that, but when you turn the volume on a microphone channel up, you amplify any ambient noise, as well as the speaker's voice. In the worst case, noise originating from the loudspeakers within the church, is picked up by the microphone and recirculated through the sound system, which further amplifies and


distorts it. In extreme cases this manifests itself as high pitched howl, which most find extremely unpleasant.

During plenary sessions, which typically happen during café church, we will typically provide two hand held radio microphones. By using these, the sound will not only carry better within the church, but it also reaches the home audience. So if you are presenting the findings of your group debate or making an observation during such services, please use the microphones provided.

The goal is to make sure that word of God is audible to both the in church and home congregations, so that services can be as inclusive as possible.

We had a lively donkey and a veritable host of angels who seemed to be reluctant to leave the stage to return to the heavens. The lack of an inn-keeper meant audience participation – and they obliged willingly with a chorus of 'NO ROOM.'

As is our tradition we had a real very new baby to show how tiny and vulnerable the Baby Jesus was and Naomi from Tadpoles obliged with baby

Joanna who was shown around to all present.

With the tableau set there was an invitation for a photo opportunity, which led to total chaos, and it was difficult to get the crowd back under control for our final carol. However, once peace reigned again the children sang the first verse of Away in a Manger beautifully and the audience joined in to end another special service to bring Christmas to our community.

It was really good to see so many of our Tadpoles families past and present in church that day.

How do we hold on to hope as the Middle East conflict persists?

Against a backdrop of prolonged and escalating conflict in Gaza, the West Bank, Israel and Lebanon, it is hard not to

feel overwhelmed by the violence and suffering. Over the past year, we have seen innocent lives lost and communities shattered. Our partners in the region continue to serve faithfully – yet, despite our prayers for peace, the situation is spiralling downwards and peace seems ever more distant.

As the conflict and violence persists, how can we continue to trust in God? And how can we be steadfast in prayer, even when circumstances appear hopeless?

Trusting God despite seemingly unanswered prayer is one of the greatest challenges in our Christian walks. We pray, we ask, we plead, we wait – and the longed-for response seems absent. But this is not a new struggle for God's people; we see this pattern play out in the Psalms, we hear it in the cries of the prophets, and we even confront it in the life of Jesus himself.

The Psalms are full of examples of people pouring out their hearts in frustration and despair. Psalm 13 opens with a cry: "How long, Lord? Will you forget me forever?" (v1). This expression of abandonment may resonate with those of us who have prayed faithfully and yet seen no immediate response. Yet the psalmist does not stop at lament. He continues: "But I trust in your unfailing love; my heart rejoices in your salvation" (Psalm 13:5). Even when faced with silence, the psalmist holds on to hope, resting in the assurance of God's unfailing love.

Back in July, as tensions between Israel and Hezbollah increased, one of our Lebanese partners wrote:

'Though it is not always easy, we have seen how God works amid darkness and destruction to bring about good. In these times of tribulation, we trust that he continues to stand with us, works with us and through us to achieve his will.'





Let us stand with our partners, holding onto the hope that one day God's kingdom of peace will come. Let us continue to pray unabated for those affected by the war in the Middle East, trusting that God can bring healing and reconciliation in ways that transcend our understanding. And let us continue calling for justice and peace, knowing that this is God's will.

Ed: Let us pray that the peace agreement under discussion comes into force and brings relief for the people of Gaza.

More than words



Here in the Hampshire countryside, the local Benefice consists of four churches: Bramley and Sherfield on Loddon are the two Parish churches, Hartley Wespall is a tiny, ancient church in the midst of farmland, and Stratfield Saye is the chapel on the Duke

of Wellington's estate, but an Anglican church as well. Our Rector lives in the Bramley vicarage, with the vicarage for the church to which I belong, Sherfield on Loddon, offered for a self-supporting "House for Duty" Associate Priest. Thus it was that two years ago we welcomed the new vicar for our parish, David, as he moved into the village and took up running our services and caring for our community, and noticed immediately how quiet and reserved he could be, how different in fact from the stereotypical idea of a minister.

As a Yorkshireman and retired engineer, I suppose we might have expected that David didn't waste spare words on social chatter; he more than made up for it, however, when he engaged with one of the subjects about which he was passionate. These included creation care and the protection of the environment, as well as reaching out to the vulnerable who don't have a voice, whether at the Memory Café he worked hard to set up to welcome those with dementia or supporting our local special school for young people (mostly non-verbal) with autism. On behalf of the latter, who are currently fundraising to build a new residential block, David undertook a sponsored sky dive, and on that subject he became almost gushing, as it was obviously one of the most exciting experiences of his life!

Quickly we realised that having a brilliant electrical engineer, who had been a lecturer in his subject at one of the country's top universities, was going to be extremely beneficial to the fabric of our old and somewhat crumbling church building. New electrical sockets appeared, fire regulations were tightened up, and the sound system control board became a showpiece of crystal-clear wiring and labelling. Just as welcome was the technical advice David so freely gave to anyone who asked him, often followed by an offer to come round and assist with the project if necessary. We got used to him dashing off after a meeting as soon as the closing prayers had been uttered to sort out an electrical problem for one of our elderly parishioners, knowing that he would stay







until everything was working perfectly again, however long it took.

As the leader of Messy Church, I invited David to participate in our sessions, and he agreed to become involved in the "Science Table", although I could tell that it was rather out of his comfort zone! On one special occasion I suggested that since we were thinking about the Holy Spirit, he might like to base the science activities around wind. I sort of expected he might have the children just build little windmills or something, but in fact he turned up with an intricately prepared kit to construct a kite, which he and the oldest of our Messy Church family (nine years old and as smart as he is delightful) sat down and built together, lost in their own little world. I then realised that the two of them had gone out onto the field behind the Community Centre where we meet, finding them there with the beautiful kite soaring above them and a growing crowd of onlookers watching in admiration.

By now, I expect you have worked out why I am writing this article about someone you will never meet. In late autumn David became ill, and although he battled on bravely as long as he could and never wanted us to make a fuss, eventually he went to hospital for tests which revealed cancer. We lost him in mid-December, the day before our Christingle service, and his funeral was movingly led by our Rector and the Bishop of Basingstoke two days before Christmas. So now we are just left with memories of his all too brief ministry among us; however, I suspect that as time passes, we will realise that we have been changed, and gained new understanding, during this short time. As a Bronze Level Eco Church (an achievement for which David worked very hard, and of which he was justifiably proud) we will continue to work towards creation care goals, both as a group and as individuals. We will cherish the most fragile of the souls entrusted to us. We will open our hearts to that unwavering love for God and our community which characterised our friend and leader. I think that as a church we have learnt, beyond a doubt, that actions speak louder than words.



TWAM

Tools with a Mission Empowering people with the tools that create livelihoods and change lives

It is some time since I published anything about this worth-

while charity and I hope it serves as a useful reminder as well as information for our newer members.

'TWAM is a Christian charity that collects unwanted usable tools, refurbishes them, sorts them into trade tool kits and sends them to the developing world for livelihood creation.'

Whilst their focus is Africa they also support local communities and organisations. For example, offcuts of haberdashery fabric that can't be sent to Africa are sent to other local charities.

Material is also sent to prisons for use in craft projects.

They send around 225 tonnes of donated, useable, refurbished tools to Africa every year.

TWAM is the main charity supported by Gray's Farm, Wokingham

Many of you may know Gray's Farm acts as a local depot/collection point for tools which are then refurbished and sent out to many countries mainly in Africa, to enable people to be self supporting.

It is mainly woodworking, metalworking, Plumbing, Electricians, and Motor mechanics tools and IT equipment that are needed.

Also, sewing and knitting machines. Many areas can also use computers and Power tools.



