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Church Services after 19th July

From 19th July most Covid guidance and legal restrictions have been lifted, including restrictions on communal worship. The emphasis is now on individuals, companies, and organisations to decide what precautions are appropriate.

At the July Church Council meeting it was agreed that for the rest of July & August we would take a cautious approach and continue with most of the precautions currently in place for services at Woosehill Church. A further review will be taken for September onwards. It is worth remembering that other users of the Church building may take a different approach.

The main change is everyone will be allowed to sing, albeit wearing a mask if not part of the choir. Coffee will continue to be normally served outside, but if raining it will be served inside. Also, whilst the chairs will still be set out at 2m, people, if they wish, can move chairs together.

There was a need to balance the desire to return to a normal service against the concerns of most people about removing too many of the Covid precautions too quickly. The precautions will be regularly reviewed to determine whether they are still required & beneficial and whether they comply with guidance from the Government and our parent Churches.

Below is a table comparing the previous & new Covid precautions for services at Woosehill Church.

Technology Team

The pandemic has made the church increasingly reliant on taking services to the people, as well as the people coming directly to services. Whilst during lockdown attendance was almost 100% over the web, the numbers attending remotely are still between 30 and 50%. The pandemic has made the ability to use technology to take the church into people's homes essential and not a 'nice to have.'

Peter Wells and his team at Saint Paul's demonstrated what was possible early in lockdown and last summer the church at Woosehill tooled up, under the guidance of Roger Prior, Craig Brown and Bob Clark, to deliver the livestreaming service that you enjoy today. Whilst we were able to deliver a satisfactory service through the summer, the technical team was depleted during the summer when Tony Sayer died and Roger Prior decided to focus on Rose Street. This left a team of two to run the sound system, which is not sustainable in the long term.

This team continued to work through the winter, but the severity of the lockdown and the process of gaining familiarity with the use of the new equipment precluded training new personnel. This has now changed and has offered us at least a window (let us hope more than that) to recruit and more importantly train new personnel, which we would like to do over the coming few weeks. If you are able to help or interested; please contact Bob Clark or Ed Smith.

We've written a comprehensive instruction booklet on how the technology is used and would see the training programme as being a combination of formal instruction and learning through experience. This would involve handson teaching outside of a service, observation of what goes on during a service, taking partial responsibility for a service, supervised responsibility for a service; all before being asked to fly solo. We want to provide a supportive and mistake tolerant learning experience. Being a member of the technical team is both rewarding and fun, so please volunteer to join us.

REFLECTION FROM OUR MINISTER

Dear Friends,

I am aware some of you have noticed the different ways of communion being served in our church and wondering why it is so.

The practice and liturgy for communion vary from denomination to denomination; within the same denomination, they vary from congregation to congregation. There are a number of factors contributing to these varying patterns in celebrating and serving communion; theology, tradition, doctrines and particular beliefs are some of them.

In some traditions, the celebrant and helpers receive the elements first. Then they would be better prepared to serve others. In some traditions, it is quite the opposite - serving people first and at the end, the presiding minister and helpers share the elements. In some traditions, the elements are taken to the congregation to their seats. Then bread and wine are consumed in turn, together.

In whatever way communion is celebrated and served, each tradition has so much significance and richness in their own practices. They enhance and enrich our understanding of the sacrament of The Lord's Supper. The symbolisms contained within the celebration of Holy Communion are strongly connected with early church traditions and Biblical precedence. In some traditions, the practices are followed quite strictly; in some, the priests have the discretion to follow a pattern that they are most inclined towards.

The priest and the helpers receiving the elements first symbolises the biblical image of the host and the guests; receiving them in the end symbolises servanthood: serving the guests first and consuming in the end; everyone receiving together signifies togetherness at the Lord's table.

The patterns and practices may vary but, in the Protestant Church, our beliefs are held together in the understanding that the sacrament of the Lord's supper is a visible sign of an invisible grace and that as followers of Christ this is for us, essentially an act of remembrance of his life, death and resurrection.

Group 1: "Regathering the Congregation" led by Steve Lewis

Group I's task was to actively reconnect together all those in the Woosehill Church family. Ensuring that everyone knows what is happening as we return to worship together and feels part of that journey.



It was decided early on that the best way of communicating with everyone would be to visit them to catchup with them and deliver a goody bag. During May and June, we agreed the content of the goody bags, gathered the various items together, printed notes and assembled the bags ready for delivery.

A key item in the goody bag was a sunflower plant for the sunflower growing competition. In early June (whilst I was away) the rest of the group started mass sunflower plant production. Two things quickly became clear, no-one had green fingers and slugs love young sunflower plants! After sowing a second batch we just managed to grow enough!

The moving of the lifting of the final lockdown restrictions from 21st June to 19th July was both a blessing and a curse. We had more time to assemble the bags and deliver them, but we had to keep the sunflower plants alive for longer. By early July everything was ready and with some trepidation we started delivering the bags on Saturday 3rd July.

Before we started, we had thought we would visit 4 to 6 homes per hour, a few minutes explaining why the visit, a quick chat, hand the bag over and then off to the next house. How wrong we were - more like 30 to 45 minutes for each visit and in some cases if Alison hadn't texted me saying dinner was ready, I think I might have been there all evening! Not that it was a problem, it was fantastic, very enjoyable, and fully justified our decision to visit people, it was just unexpected!

Often the conversations were about Covid, Church services, Soba, but we also talked about the weather, work, the children, football (inevitably), holidays, computers, decorating, asbestos, gardening and so on. The most surprising thing was the reaction to the sunflower plant - for a few it was trepidation, "I can't grow anything", but mostly it was excitement and a determination to win – I didn't realise

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Woosehill Church members were so competitive!

In just over a week we visited and delivered bags to 48 households. If we've missed someone it was unintentional, please get in contact as we have a few spares (except sunflower plants). In addition, we gave bags to Soba, Richard, Catherine, Cara and Elaine so they would know what we've been doing, what was in the bag and most importantly they wouldn't sulk because they didn't have a sunflower plant for the growing competition

Was visiting everyone worthwhile? Yes, undoubtedly, we had some great feedback during the visits, people thanked us for calling and messages afterwards thanking us for the goody bag. It has also helped us understand what would need to change (or not) for people to return to worshipping in Church. For me personally it was very enjoyable (and as a Steward it was very worthwhile), for some people I probably talked with them for longer than I have ever done before and have got to know them (and they me) a bit better. It has shown that there is a Woosehill Church family, but it needs nurturing to grow and flourish and we need to think how to do that. If you have any ideas, or better still want to be actively involved please contact us.

Finally I'd like to thank the group members, Amy, Jeanette and Geoff for their efforts, not only visiting, delivering bags and growing sunflower plants, but, in many ways more importantly, their input into the content of the bag, questioning and refining the purpose and message of what was in the bag. Guys, I couldn't had done it without you. I'd also like to thank everyone we visited, without your friendly welcome and willingness to engage the visits would not have been the success they were.

Monday Home Group The Book of Job

The Monday Home Group decided, at my request, to read and analyse the Book of Job. Why Job? Well basically I knew the story and was intrigued by the phrase *Jobs' comforters*. As Ed Smith mentioned it was a bit repetitive in sections and indeed at times it was hard going,



all 42 chapters of it, which we covered at about 3 chapters each week. Soba mentioned that repetition was a good learning tool. Geoff took prayers, for which we could add subjects which we wanted, at the end of each session.

Job was *a perfect and upright man* (1:8) and the Book describes the long and difficult trial he experienced.

So what were some of the things I learnt from the Book of Job?

Comfort those who suffer

Job was in a very dark place at the height of his trials. Rather than comforting him, his friends insisted he must have sinned which had caused his suffering. This led Job to call them *miserable comforters* (16:2). He didn't need correcting, he needed comforting. He needed a kind word or just being there for him and saying nothing.

All people suffer

It does not matter whether you are good or bad, you cannot judge a person spiritually as to how much they suffer.

Tests

Life's tests can last for a minute or, in some cases, a lifetime. Tests are part of a person's spiritual growth and part of your personal development. We may not know why we are tested so it is the way we respond that is significant. We must draw nearer to God so that he can be a comforter. Suffering can be really intense. However much the pain and suffering, God is still there. For the righteous God will reward abundantly (the Lord gave Job twice as much as he had before, Job 42:10).

God has enormous dominion over the natural world

Although there was some disagreement in the group as to what the modern name of some the animals listed were, there is no mistaking the power of God over the natural world. If you are a quiz addict you will find the answer as to whether a horse can run faster than an ostrich in Job (the answer is no, the ostrich can run faster). God has given talents to various creatures.

Job was before his time

Steve mentioned that Job was before his time: And in all the land were no women found so fair as the daughters of Job: and their father gave them inheritance among their brethren. (Job 42:15). No sexual discrimination then!

Conclusion

To get to spiritual maturity you have to experience adversity, *In this world ye shall have tribulation but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world*, Jesus said (John 16:33).



A prayer for this world:


