Music Evolution

Recently my husband and I enjoyed the "experience" he gave me for my Christmas present; we've given up trying to think of stuff to give each other, so we buy tickets for performances or events we can share. My present to him was a stand-up comedy



events we can share. My present to him was a stand-up comedy show, which we giggled our way through last month, and his to me was a live reworking of the 1973's prog-rock classic album Tubular Bells by one of the composer Mike Oldfield's musical collaborators.

In my first year at university, I played Tubular Bells until the vinyl was practically transparent, and it became very special to me. However, my life and taste in music moved on, and I hadn't heard it for many years. I was curious about how it would sound in today's very different world, and a little apprehensive about being disappointed, but I needn't have worried; the show exceeded my expectations in many ways. The piece had been rearranged for an 8-piece live band including two percussionists, and although the keyboard player and one of the guitarists were of the same vintage as the music, the rest were in their twenties, and impressively talented. They played with enthusiasm and joy, which communicated itself to the (mostly mature) audience and won them a standing ovation at the end of the show.

We all know how important good music is to the experience we get from our services of worship. If we hadn't realised it before, it hit us rather forcefully when we all had to worship online during COVID! At Woosehill we were blessed to have a Music Group who for many years provided the foundation on which our services were based, and many of us will remember with great thankfulness how they provided us with wonderful experiences of worship at a time during an interregnum when few other spiritual resources were available to us. Even now their legacy continues in the songs we learnt to love, which reactivate our faith whenever we hear them.

I know that many big inner-city churches are fortunate enough to be bouncing along with 5-piece bands and impressive sound mixing equipment, but out in the sticks it can be a very different story. Traditional rural churches have



churches have lovely organs, but very few people to play them, and the ones who can are usually of the older generation. The style of hymns which sound best played on an organ is often a long way from the personal taste of many of the congregation, especially the younger members! Yet the alternative, to move towards the work of gifted contemporary hymn writers like Stuart Townend and Matt Redman, requires finding and recruiting musicians who are often incredibly busy people, so they have little time to arrange, rehearse or collaborate with others. Sometimes it all seems so challenging that we are tempted to give up, but then of course you are faced with the unpalatable alternative: recorded backing music!

However, with faith and perseverance, I do believe that we are finding ways of keeping the music in our churches fresh and (mostly) live. Woosehill has made connections with various generous folk who are willing to share their musical gifts, and I have been touched at their hard work and expertise. At St Leonards we have just welcomed a couple, newly moved to the area, who have a lot of experience leading modern worship music, and he is a very talented guitarist. Even if they only play and sing at our monthly Café Church, it will be a huge boost to the outreach we are hoping to provide in our community. It means we can enjoy "Bless the Lord O my soul" regularly, going back to "Great is thy faithfulness" in our more traditional services when we have an organist.

We all want our worship to engage our emotions, and music is such a huge part of that. I believe that God is revealing new ways for churches to creatively use the musical talents of the community, even if it means a lot of work for those who organise, arrange and communicate in order to make it happen. If that's the case, I'm prepared to put up with the occasional week having to sing along with (or rather two bars behind) a recorded track!

The Parish Retreat 3-5 March 2023

I was a bit apprehensive about the idea of going on the parish retreat, something I had never done before — Colin was definitely keener than me! We drove down to Woking late on the Friday afternoon and found St Columba's House Retreat Centre where we would spend the weekend.

Some of the group had already arrived and we were warmly welcomed into the bright and warm foyer by them and the reception staff as we signed in. We were given keys to our rooms and were pleasantly surprised by the modern accommodation with ensuite facilities – so we weren't going to spend the weekend in a cell!

We had been told to expect a light supper so most of us had eaten a more substantial lunch than usual and were surprised to be served salmon with green vegetables, potato wedges — and pavlova to follow. Already this weekend is full of surprises. The catering throughout the weekend was a constant surprise and delight with fresh home-made food as well as sweet treats at coffee breaks.

At 7.15 pm we adjourned to the beautiful modern chapel where Rev'd Roy Burgess and Mary Cassidy gave us some background information after which we had a short service adapted from Wild Goose material sitting in a semicircle facing the altar.

After the service we went to the room where we were to spend most of our discussion time over the next two days – St Francis – and after a few technical issues watched the second part of 'Jesus of Nazareth' (yes, the blue-eyed Robert Powell version). It remains a powerful film with much of the script taken directly from scripture and was to be a basis for our discussion sessions over the weekend.

Our day finished with Night Prayer (Compline) following the Northumbrian Community Liturgy and from there in silence to our rooms for an early night.

We were all back in the chapel at 7.45am for Morning Prayer from the Book of Common Prayer after which we broke our silence in the refectory for breakfast.

An hour's discussion on The Betrayal ranged on Matthew's Gospel and widened to personal experience within a safe space. At this point one of our group with hearing loss was really struggling and in a real answer to prayer a deaf awareness seminar was taking place in the next room so he was able to join it and get much needed advice and pastoral support. It was not only he who was uplifted by this, we were all thrilled at this 'God-incidence'.

After lunch the afternoon was spent in silence to spend as we chose—in the chapel, oratory, our rooms or the grounds (but it was cold!), before a final discussion session, evening prayer and another delicious dinner.

We had a free evening when some took themselves to a quiet space while others knitted, played a game or did a jigsaw in quiet, but not silent companionship in St Francis. Again we ended the day with Compline, this time in the stunning circular Oratory before leaving in silence until Sunday morning. Morning prayer from the Northumbrian Community was followed by time to discuss the weekend – had it met expectations; how would we move forward? There had been a real sense of growing fellowship and sharing over the weekend which contributed to making it a very special time.

We ended with Roy leading us in a Eucharist Service after which he played 'One more step along the world we go' and Mary led us around the church in a procession which eventually took us up past the altar. It was a truly memorable weekend and we are so grateful to Roy and Mary for leading and organising.


Would I go again? Yes! St Columba's is a special place of peace and renewal. I was the only one from Woosehill Church but that didn't matter at all.

6s and 7s started off in September 2021 as a group for people who were just about to change Schools or had just done so. We realised that there were a number of people in that situation and they made a really nice sized- group to meet online every other Monday, to get to know each other, to play games, to pray together and to talk about faith. In September 2022 this Monday group was joined by a new group meeting in person every Wednesday evening- led and organised primarily by one of the young people at Church, Esther Lamey - for games, prayer and talk about Jesus. The group started by talking about Matthew's Gospel. The groups also needed to be renamed 5, 6, 7, 8 as we broadened out the membership. We have about 12 young people who come along on either a Monday or a Wednesday and it has been brilliant to watch them getting to know each other while also talking with increasing confidence about what they think and what they know of God.

We are very fortunate in the leaders we have, who are happy to share their own thoughts and to come regularly while also being very happy to take a back seat if the conversation is flowing. We are also fortunate in the way that biscuits keep magically appearing on a Wednesday and equally magically disappearing during the evening.

Since the Pandemic it has become more and more important to seize opportunities as they come past us rather than planning too far ahead and 5, 6, 7, 8 is an example of that. It is also an example of how well a mixed-economy Church can flourish, since online suits some people (and means that they can fit the group in during busy evenings) while some people still prefer to meet in person.

A Lent Reflection

Pay attention

God is omnipresent. Always present, at every moment.

We don't need to wait for God to 'show up'. What we need to do is open our awareness. Faith, in a way, is therefore merely the practice of paying attention.

That's easier said than done in the age of distraction, when we're encouraged to focus anywhere but the present moment. We can't be distant from God, but we can be distracted from God.

So here is a challenge for you this Lent: pay attention.

Pay attention to yourself. Your depths. Your aches. Your desires. Your tiredness. Your anger. God is in those things.

Pay attention to the world. It really is astonishing. Pay attention to other people. They're all going through something.

Pay attention to hope. It's real. While the news tends to focus our attention only on what's going wrong in the world, there is plenty going right. God is not in a state of dismay; God is moving, working, feeding the great work of restoration.

Always-present God, help us to pay attention. To the world. To other people. To ourselves. And ultimately, to you. Amen

Send Three and Fourpence we're going to a Dance

Having started with perhaps the oldest joke about communicating that I know, I need to talk about how we communicate what we are doing within church and to do that I need to describe what the channels available for communicating within the church are and also mention their publishing lead times. Generally we use these channels to publicise the events and groups we care about as a congregation and the main channels are:

- The web site, which is considered to be the church reference source and is the medium that is often the first port of call to those outside of the church. By its very nature such information does not have a publishing deadline, other than that desired by the author or that which the author deems to be necessary to get the support from the church community for the event or activity they are seeking to publicise. In general, straight forward requests to update the website can be handled within a day, but if substantial work is needed this could take longer
- Facebook is used to publicise recent and future events and if the
 website is the reference source, Facebook can be thought of as a
 series of post cards. Again there is a short lead time to publication but
 time scales again rely on the level of work to be done.
- The notice sheet provides current information about what is happening when, and ideally the information provided should be succinct and delivered in a timely fashion to allow for publication by the middle of the week, it is however possible to put out late amendments and additions to the notice sheet.
- The magazine is for more contemplative reading and also externally facing material as well as publicity for events coming at a later date. This has a deadline for publication date, which is available on the web site and is shown in RED inside the front cover of the magazine. It is also announced in the weekly newsletter around two weeks ahead.
- Finally, we have poster communication and periodic publicity delivery, which tends to be managed corporately within the church according to a strict timetable.

From this description it is clear that information needs to be more substantial than just the time and place of the event; it needs to be well formatted and written in a way that engages the reader. In order to achieve this, providers need to think through what the appropriate channel is. The information should be delivered in time for the publishers (that is the people who look after the bulleted avenues) to process it and so it is available to readers when they need to see it. Sadly there have been some occasions when this has not been done, hence the need for this reminder to be written. As with all communications, the starting point is that the author needs to think through what they want to achieve and who they are trying to get their message to.

The division of labour is that publishers will publish material received in good time provided they see no issues with it and if appropriate they will advise information providers and authors on how to adapt their submission to a usable format. When extensive reformatting of information and the provision of supporting images is required this is the responsibility of the information provider. If they do not have the necessary skills, then they should negotiate with the publisher to identify a workable approach. Ultimately, publishers are not as closely involved with the event being advertised or reported on and therefore authors need to put across their message in a way that meets their objectives and engages their intended audience.

We all have a common goal, which is to ensure that the church engages as effectively and efficiently with the congregation and the community as it can. Understanding that we can only do that if our standards of communication are of the highest order and delivered in a timely fashion is crucial. If we do as suggested in this article we will not need reinforcements to advance as a community and you will avoid the risk of any helpful provider dropping a very bad pun into your communication.
