

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The Lamey Legacy

As the stewards and ministry team from Woosehill turned up at the welcome event (or "Death by Quiche, as these things are often called...) in St Paul's Parish Room that evening all those years ago, we were aware of people all around us filled with what they were desperately afraid was an unreasonable hope. St Paul's and all associated with it had been through a tough time, and everyone was discouraged and in need of healing. That night there was simultaneously a longing for comfort and spiritual revival, and a self-defensive doubt that it could be within reach. Could a new beginning for the parish really be within that room, eating cheese straws and about to meet the congregation who were expecting them to wear a cape and leap tall buildings at a single bound? I filled my plate, did the rounds, and eventually said hello to someone who seemed to radiate

energy, empathy and sincerity. At that moment I immediately felt a load lift from my shoulders, as did everybody else. Richard Lamey had arrived in our midst.

One of the brilliant things about being within Richard's fold in my role as an LLM at Woosehill was that he shares ministry so generously, and I was soon invited to preach at a service at St Paul's. Unfamiliar with incense, bells and processions, I was somewhat amazed that once we had robed, Richard and I walked out of the vestry door and set off with the immaculate choir across the churchyard following the Cross, with the incense thurible being swung as we went. The fact that there was a howling gale and driving rain did not seem to deter any of them in the least, and as we rounded the corner of the church and headed for the huge front door, having stopped to relight the thurible for the third time, Richard turned to me, blinked the raindrops from his lashes, and with a blinding smile shouted over the wind noises: "Isn't this fun?"! Richard can do solemnity very well, but he also brings joy to it, and it's an irresistible combination.

Also, of course, he brings wisdom. It is often difficult to process the fact that someone with so many people skills can have such an outstanding theological brain, because famously the two attributes very rarely coexist. Those sermons...oh, those sermons. I have never heard Richard preach a bad



unchristian feeling of envy that engenders in the hearts of those of us who are! Over the years he has given us informative ones, inspiring ones, restorative ones, playful ones. All of them have offered an opportunity to understand our faith more deeply and grow in our spiritual lives; whether we have grasped that opportunity has, of course, been up to us as individuals. The one which perhaps stands out for me most took a very familiar passage, Luke 8: 40-56, and invited us to imagine a conversation between the two women who were healed by Jesus, Jairus' daughter and the woman suffering from a gynaecological problem, as they reunited many years later. It was both profound and accessible, and I don't know anybody else who could have written or delivered it.

We have received so many other blessings throughout Richard's ministry that it is impossible to list them all. Let's hope we can remember the examples of leadership, collaboration and innovation so that now that he is moving on, we can continue the work he started. Our thanks and best wishes go with him and his lovely family to Norwich, a wonderful city which is about to get a whole lot more wonderful!

Because, for those of us left behind.....well, it can go one of two ways, I guess. Interregnums can be times when new teams form, fresh gifts get discovered and shared, and the whole church/parish moves forward together, making the best of what God has given them. They can also be times when everybody runs about like headless chickens, moaning about the good old days. It's up to us, really; we have had the privilege of learning from someone who is as clear and bright a channel of God's grace as we are ever going to meet. We can choose to continue along the path on which Richard has guided us, using everything we learnt from him, or we can pretend that it has all disappeared up to Norwich in his moving van. I say "we", because the advice and support I received from Richard didn't in any way cease when I moved away from Wokingham in 2015, eventually settling in a different diocese altogether, and that is another amazing thing about him.

For the past few years, I have been working hard on my Richardisms. I have been experimenting with different formats of sermon: some personal, some using the listeners' imagination, some straightforward teaching. I have tried

to use humour to defuse awkward tensions in church meetings, although frankly, sunny charm is not really my thing! I sadly have to admit that I haven't yet invented my own anthropomorphic, dairy-obsessed avatar capable of giving people courage and inspiration during a global crisis, but I assure you it is only a matter of time before I do. How are your Richardisms going? Do you need more practise? It's very important to observe keenly for the next few months, so that by the time the final farewell "Death by Quiche" events take place in June and July, we will all be proficient. Then we can be sure that Wokingham, the Parish of St Paul's and St Nick's, and Woosehill Church will continue to shine just as brightly as they have for the past eleven and a half years.

The Miracle of Pentecost

We celebrated Pentecost last Sunday, commemorating the coming down of the Holy Spirit upon early believers and the creation of a new community.



The Acts of the Apostles tells us that the number of disciples has grown one hundred and twenty of them - and were now in Jerusalem, waiting in eager anticipation, as instructed by Christ. They spent their days in worship and prayer, awaiting the great day of fulfilment. We can imagine in a congregation of that size, how excited they would have been. There was certainly a time of apprehension among the disciples until the appearance of the risen Christ. But after their Master's ascension, their anxiety and fear were replaced by joy and expectation for the fulfilment of the promise of Christ.

And it happened! While they were gathered together in a house, The Holy Spirit came down with a sound that of a mighty wind. This sound brought many other God-fearing people to the scene. After Peter explaining to them the miracle of Pentecost and exhorting them to repent, three thousand people presented themselves for baptism on that day alone. In all senses, Pentecost is a day of miracles!

This great occasion that gave birth to a new community by the Holy Spirit, through whom the new faith spread all around the world and still continuing with its creating and empowering activity, is regrettably `only a Sunday` in our churches. What is more regrettable is the fact that the intervening forty-nine days from Easter, have lost their significance. Certainly, the occasion of the Pentecost is a major spiritual boost for worshippers and believers, but an eager anticipation in between, like the season of advent before Christmas or Lent and the Holy Week before Easter is largely absent in our current church traditions.



Jesus Christ established the Kingdom of God in the world and called all believers to work for its fulfilment. It is for this sake, the empowering, envisioning and inspiring activity of the Holy Spirit first manifested at Pentecost. As we have seen in the holy seasons of Advent and Lent culminating on great days of celebrations, a period of preparation and anticipation preceding Pentecost would enable Christians to remember and recall the values and virtues of our calling as disciples of Christ. The primary task of our discipleship is to make more disciples. The Holy Spirit gives us the power to work towards that and to make sure that is universally perpetual.

A Reflection on the reading from Acts 1.15-17,21-26

In only two chapters of Acts the world has changed utterly- the dam has been breached and now the great lake of God's love and kindness is released to wash over the earth, a second flood, which we are part of, only this time it will water the earth and not drown it, causing the seeds to grow and yielding a great harvest.

The one thing to remember is that the thing that changes the world is Peter saying "I might be wrong. God might be doing this. We should just rejoice at what we see." Which takes us back to the start- it's when we rejoice at what God is doing and remember that God is God and we are not, when we lay aside our assumptions, our judgement, our pride, our superiority, that the Church can become the body we are meant to be, built not for our comfort out of those who think and look and live like us but built on the radical and wonderful love of God who tells us in Jesus that he has chosen us, and that his Church is made up of all those who keep the great commandment to love as we have been loved first, whatever might separate them in human terms and whatever their differences might be.

The church is meant to be a little piece of heaven on earth, made up of everybody God loves, which is to say everybody. The world might define and divide but we do not. Do you love Jesus a little? Then come in and sit down and tell us all about it.

Dear Friends,

I am writing to you in order to initiate the Diocesan Synod elections, to elect a new Diocesan Synod to serve and hold office for the next 3-year period (triennium 2024-2027 starting 1st August 2024).

As Area Dean, I will be responsible for conducting the elections to the House of Laity.

Currently, Sonning Deanery are allocated four representatives in the House of Laity.

For those wishing to stand for election, the paperwork must be completed and returned to me at rector@spauls.co.uk by no later than midday on Friday 7th June.

Should more than four candidates put themselves forward, an election will be held. In this eventuality, voting paperwork will be sent out to lay members of the Sonning Deanery Synod on 17th June, with replies required no later than 3rd July. The Declaration and Statement of Results would then be issued on 8th July.

Any person over the age of 16 who is on the electoral roll of a parish within the Deanery is eligible to stand for election to the Diocesan Synod. However, they must be proposed and seconded by members of Sonning Deanery Synod.

Hence, in order to reach the widest possible pool of candidates I am asking for the support of Incumbents, PCC Secretaries and Church Wardens.

I ask for your help in ensuring that the following information and paperwork be made available to as many members of your parish's electoral roll as possible. This could be through email, notices within services, information posted on parish websites, or items brought to the attention of the PCC, notes and paperwork available within church promises.

The Diocese is particularly keen for Christians from under-represented parts of the Church to put themselves forward and as such, your support is greatly appreciated.


