#### Woosehill Church Christmas Post

It may not be beginning to feel a lot like Christmas, but we can still carry on with church traditions to make sure that it soon does. So, the Woosehill Church Christmas post-box will be running from Friday 4<sup>th</sup> December. There are a few changes to how we normally run it. As the Church is not open at the moment the post-box will be placed in the



church foyer and cards can be posted through the Church letter box. The cards will be collected regularly during the week. Last posting date is earlier than usual, **Friday 18th December**. This gives us more time to sort through the cards. All cards will be hand delivered to your home this year by our lovely volunteer helpers. All cards will have been in quarantine for 3 days before we deliver them. Your cards will be together in a sealed plastic bag. Whilst sorting out the cards we will wear masks and gloves to minimise the risk.

#### Lockdown Reflection

I don't miss my close friends. Oh, I miss seeing them face to face, I miss sharing a cup of tea with them, chatting face to face. I miss the casual touch, the hug of greeting or of comfort. But I do see them! I see them online, in Zoom, FaceTime, WhatsApp, etc. I get to talk to them. I know they are OK.

It's the same for my family. I long for the time when we can meet properly again. I want to hug my grandchildren. But I do see them regularly, and play online games with them. I know what's going on in their lives. I know they are OK.

But there are some I do miss. The people I am not so close to, but who I used to see regularly, especially at church on Sunday mornings. People I might bump into in Morrison's in the days when we shopped frequently & weren't hiding behind masks.

People I valued because they were part of our church family. I miss our church family.

People I have not seen, have not spoken to, since Covid began. I do not know what is going on in their lives. I do not know if they will still be around when all this is over. I do not know if they are OK.

We are created to live in community. From the first moment when God said of Adam 'It is not good for the man to be alone', the Bible is full of advice about living in community. God is a relational being and we are made in his image. Community is important for everyone.

As Christians our fellowship with each other is of even more importance. Jesus said

"By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another." (John 13:35) And the author of Hebrews wrote "Let us not give up meeting together......but let us encourage one another" (Hebrews 10: 2) It is a duty and a joy to both give and receive the encouragement of other Christians.

In I Corinthians 12 St Paul describes the church as the body of Christ, made up of many parts. "If one part suffers, every part suffers with it; if one part is honored, every part rejoices with it." **(I Corinthians 12:26)** He tells the Ephesians that we are all "members together of one body, and sharers together in the promise in Christ Jesus." (Ephesians 3:6)

In the communion service we echo Paul's words to the Corinthians (I Corinthians 10:17) saying "Though we are many, we are one body because we all share in one bread".

It is difficult at the moment because we cannot meet together, cannot sing hymns together, cannot share the Eucharist together. We pray desperately for this all to be over and perhaps the end is in sight with the promise of vaccines in the New Year. In the meantime what more can we do to 'meet together & encourage one another' especially as Christmas approaches? So many of our Christmas services will be on line with minimum personal attendance. Some, especially the carol singing, simply won't happen. At least the post box will still be in operation, thanks to Emma, and this year I will be sending real cards!

Is there anything else we can do? If not, then we should all make every effort to meet together using the means we have available, especially the Sunday zoom coffee mornings and the Advent course on Tuesday afternoons or evenings. If there is anyone who would like to join in but cannot access Zoom do please get in touch with me or Lynn Smith or the clergy.

I moved in here on 4th August, and have since been getting settled in, unpacking, sorting furniture, getting curtains etc. Now pretty well all sorted. It is a two bedroom bungalow, one of three converted from a former care home. It has been done to a very high standard, and is a delight to live in.

My middle daughter Mary and husband Andy live five minutes walk away, and my youngest daughter Joanna and family (who used to live in Windmill Avenue) are in Corsham three miles away, so I have family to call on in case of need. I see them both regularly. There is a small Co-op three minutes walk away which is very convenient, and Sainsbury, Lidl and B&Q quite close - I still do all my own shopping. Covid levels in Wiltshire are still pretty low.

I am quite fit, although I had a nasty bout of bursitis in my left elbow after a spill from my bike in the local woods. It slowly got better with antibiotics.

Our very popular group for under fives and their carers has not been able to meet in church since March, but we have made every effort to stay in touch with our families.

A very special aspect of Tadpoles has always been the support and friendship which develops amongst our (mainly) Mums and Grannies. We encourage this by keeping the group small and this has always been very much appreciated.

So what do you do when you are suddenly unable to meet?

We have a fairly active 'Tadpoles at Woosehill' Facebook page which is just for members past and present - many of our former families stay in touch with us through this means. During the time we have been closed we have posted messages of support as well as craft ideas to do at home, often on Wednesday mornings with the first line of our circle song 'Hello everyone, how are you today?'

Our technology took a significant leap during the summer when Emma Wells offered an afternoon Zoom session of story and craft. The take up was small but much enjoyed by the participants, especially Molly and Daisy who joined in weekly.

After the summer break we rather ran out of steam, not knowing who had now moved on to nursery or big school. Ruth then had the great idea, picked up from Mothers' Union, of offering coffee at the church door after school drop off. This has developed to often include a craft bag to take away (Covid secure!) and a story. All this is weather permitting and we have so far been pretty lucky!

What has emerged from this exercise, is a realisation that perhaps the mums are missing the group more than the children, who are catered for in other settings. On some Wednesdays we have no children, but former Tadpoles mums drop by for coffee and chat - perhaps this is something to build on in

As Advent approached, Sue Youle suggested we might reach out to our families with the message of Advent and Christmas. This is the message from our Facebook page, written by Sue:

# The light shines in the darkness and the darkness has not overcome it.' John 1:5

We would like to invite you to celebrate the light and hope of Christmas with us as we journey through Advent together.

## Easy Fundraising reminder

#### easyfundraising feel good shopping

EasyFundraising is a way for the Church to gain extra income from your online shopping at no cost to you, and is simple to use. It's safe to use as you still buy from the retailers own web site with all the usual security and delivery information available. By going to the retailers web site via **EasyFundraising** they will record your visit and make a small donation to the Church if you purchase something.

Easy Fundraising works on any common computer, laptop, tablet or smartphone. It will look a little different depending on your device and software, but the principles remain the same. To get started either download and open the EasyFundraising App, or use any of the common web browsers and go to

http://www.easyfundraising.org.uk/woosehillchurch.

If you have used Easy Fundraising before simple Log In, or if you have not used it before you will need to create an account with your name and email address. Once you have an account search for Woosehill Community Church as the organisation you wish to support. You are now set up to start fundraising for the Church. You can search for retailers by name, although not every retailer is part of the Easy-Fundraising scheme. If the retailer you want is there click on their name and when their page comes up it will show you what donations are available, click on the Shop Now button. You will be taken to the retailers own web site and anything you purchase will qualify for the donation, usually a percentage of the goods value, sometimes a fixed amount donation.

Here are some tips I have found useful to increase the donations to Woosehill Church

- Comparison web sites such as Compare The Market often make large one-off donations, currently  $\pm 12.50$  if you buy insurance through their site. So you can support the Church while you are saving on your car insurance.
- Most Chrome and Edge web browsers have an EasyFundraising add on that will alert you to a possible donation when you are on a retailers web site, so you don't miss out on donations.
- Its worth shopping around for products that are available from multiple retailers to find the one offering the best donation.
- EasyFundraising often make special offers of increased donations for a period of time, or for specific goods.

Many popular retailers support EasyFundraising, larger ones such as John Lewis, Amazon, M&S, AO.com, plus a lot of smaller retailers if you prefer to look after them too. Currently Woosehill Church is receiving about £250 per year from EasyFundraising donations, lets see if we can beat that in 2021. # THE COWSHED

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The Cowshed is a new charity which provides support to people of all backgrounds in a time of personal crisis. The aim of The Cowshed is to provide good quality cleaned and ironed clothes and other essentials for individuals and families in Berkshire experiencing hardship. The clothes are donated from the general public as well as retailers and manufacturers; they are then sorted, washed and ironed at our premises ready to be delivered or collected by social services, other health professionals or our clients. The idea is that our clients feel they are receiving a gift to assist them in a time of crisis rather than some old clothes that are over worn, marked or damaged.

We offer our services to people from all faiths and none. We work in partnership with support services such as GPs, Health Visitors, Churches, charities and social service agencies who provide us with referrals.

We are grateful of all donations of new or used clothing, footwear, bedding & curtains at our lovely new distribution centre in Winnersh, 4 Kings Street Lane, RG415AS on Monday - Thursday 10am - 3pm. (It is a very new building on your right as you enter King Street Lane opposite Sainsbury's and has 4 KSL on the front by the door)

We love what we do at The Cowshed and are constantly being reminded how lucky we are to have such wonderful people supporting us so we can offer help to those who most need it in our local community, especially during Covid.

We are privileged to have been able to support a variety of individuals of all ages in very different but difficult situations including those fleeing domestic abuse, individuals and families experiencing emergency rehousing, health issues resulting in poverty, the homeless, emergency custody situations, poor housing conditions to name but a few.



All of these people are in our local community and required help with clothing, shoes, bedding, curtains and other essential items.

# HOW WE RE-USE AND RECYCLE

We use all the clothes that are donated to us – the good quality items are washed and ironed ready for our clients and the slightly damaged clothes/ bedding are repurposed by our community arts and crafts group into items for us to sell, and tote bags for us to put our referrals in. Any remaining textiles are collected by a recycling organisation to raise further funds to help sustain the charity. We are averaging donations of between 3 and 4 tonnes a month, all of which has been recycled in some way, either for direct use for our referrals or in our other initiatives, saving a huge amount from landfill.





# News from one of our local church charities

We've had a great start to our new project, <u>The</u> <u>Lounge</u>. First of all, we enjoyed meeting with each

year group bubble at The Emmbrook School to discuss the idea with them and give them lots of time to think and tell us what they would like The Lounge to look like. At

Soulscape, we always seek to be led by the young people themselves, so that our projects provide what they really need and address the issues that truly matter to them. The Emmbrook students have been great partners in shaping their new space with us.

We've had to think about how to run a low-pressure drop-in space but still keep students within their bubbles. Our solution is to open The Lounge through the lunch break, with two 'shifts' each day. This means, for example, that Year 10s can drop in during the first half of Monday lunch time, and Year 7s can drop in during the last half. Other year groups get a turn on different week days.

Our aim is to create a space to "come as you are", rest, and – if you want to - talk to our volunteers or explore an activity like the one below.



The team set up 12 of these jars in The Lounge to prompt discussion about recognising how we're feeling. They had great conversations with the students about what feelings might be inside the different jars.

One student this term summed it up by saying: **"Thank you for just listening to me."** We are really looking forward to seeing how The Lounge develops over the rest of the year.
