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
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Clergy Letter

The Banner Group Have Been Busy!

Well the banner group don't just make banners! They have diversified!! In Autumn last year Doreen asked if the group could make a prayer mat for the church's Tadpoles group. Specifically, the chief frog wanted something that the children could sit round and hold to help them sit still during prayers as the end of each Tadpoles session.

As the mat was going to have to form quite a large circle to fit everyone round, (even with some in the middle) we decided to divide it the circle into 8 segments so that Banner Group members could work on these at home. This turned out to be an excellent strategy as with the advent of Covid-19 in Spring this year we were unable to meet in the normal way. The design plan was for each segment to depict a bible story. It was left to individual Banner Group members to select a bible story and select an appropriate background colour and segment design. After many, many hours of patient needlework by the team members the prayer mat was completed at the start of September. Doreen expressed delight at the final result but of course Tadpoles are currently not meeting in the normal way.



Tales of the Unexpected and Elephants and Giraffes

Back in May I ordered twenty-five very nice cards with sewing machines on to thank everyone for their contribution to sewing scrubs and making scrubs hats and bags during lockdown.

People may well remember responding to a request sent round the Parish, for sheets for scrubs bags, buttons for mask extenders and cards on which to write encouraging wishes for staff receiving the scrubs.

Five months on and my 'thank you' cards are redundant. The fantastic group of people which has come to be known as 'Wokingham Hub 33' has never stopped sewing and thanks to the amazing fund-raising efforts of eleven year old Noah Evans and his celebrity dad Chris, probably never will!!!

To explain a little: they raised **over £1,250,000!** to fund material for the NHS. This was used initially for scrubs and scrubs hats, then, towards the end of lockdown a wonderful rainbow fabric was commissioned, designed by Liberty designer Tessa Semple. This was designed to specifications laid down by the NHS for hospital use and specific patterns were used to meet the requirements of different departments. The hope was that some staff in every hospital in UK would be presented with a set of rainbow scrubs.

It is a testimony to the enthusiasm and dedication of everyone involved, that not a bit of this fabric has been wasted or used for anyone but an NHS staff member.

The fabric has delighted and uplifted the recipients and our group has been able to present friends and family in the NHS with hats and scrubs bags trimmed with rainbows, as well as producing an array of garments for staff and young patients at the request of local and not so local hospitals.

There has been such a demonstration of love and faith driving our group forward. When supplies of whatever we have needed have dwindled they have been replaced the next day by someone turning up on the doorstep with what is needed. On one occasion, oversized scrubs bags were made by a group member and I hesitated to deliver them to our hub at Ascot only to be told 'Ann they are exactly what we need today!'







When we began to respond to requests in other parts of the UK it was incredible how the means to fulfil these requests just appeared. Money for postage was donated and then the wonderful network of motor bike riders VRUK (Voluntary Riders UK) offered their services.

There's plenty of work ahead with Frimley NHS Trust needing 20,000 face masks for staff. We are also making pjs for the children's wards and children's theatre gowns.

Look at how the scraps are being used and you'll see how this really has been a tale of the unexpected and elephants and giraffes!!!



A new way of praying together

As you know, our "Together in Prayer" meetings were held monthly in the Church

sanctuary. A committed little bunch of us would sit in a circle by our cross, light a candle and pray for our Church and its members, our Parish, and our community as we were led in the Spirit. Then came lockdown..........Oh dear, now what do we do?

Of course, it was imperative that we continued to meet and pray together so I hesitantly set up an online group. Back then, we were all finding our way with new ways of doing things and I was among those unsure of how this virtual stuff all worked. In particular, I felt worried about how praying together could work in this new way - but how wrong I was. I should have known to have the faith to challenge my fears and trust in Gods promises, moving me past a place of being hesitant and unsure. Romans chapter 8 v14 &15 says "because those who are led by the Spirit of God are sons of God. For you did not receive a spirit that makes you a slave again to fear" In other words be bold and just get on with it!

We decided to meet weekly as the need to pray was very great with all that was happening around us. Our first hour together was on April 1st and my notes say we needed to pray for peace and comfort, health and healing, strength, and hope - not necessarily in that order! I was still wondering how this would work but handed over our meeting to God and asked that His Spirit come close. As familiar faces appeared on my iPad screen, it felt so good to be together again. As usual we began with some bible verses and a discussion about our prayer needs, then entered a quiet time as we settled for prayer. At this point, I wobbled - would we all start praying at the same time? Would we be able to sense the Spirit's leading as we sat in our homes in front of a screen? Oh, ye of little faith, my fears changed to joy as our prayers flowed and our pauses for silent prayer were perfectly timed. Romans 8 v26 says "the Spirit helps us in our weakness. We don't know what we ought to pray for, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with groans

that words cannot express "Well, Zoom was certainly not going to stop the work of the Spirit, He really is the 'enabler' - praise be to God.

As the weeks have turned into months, we have decided to return to meeting on the 3rd Thursday of each month, unless an urgent need for joint prayer arises. We will continue on Zoom so anyone who has access to the internet can join us during the dark evenings. Please get in touch with me if you would like to join us (lyn@lynbrown.me) and I will give you the passwords.

I stress the confidential nature of our meetings, so please get in touch if you have a prayer need which perhaps you feel isn't appropriate for our Church prayer chain. I finish with comforting words from Psalm 62 v8:

"Trust in him at all times, O people; pour out your hearts to him, for God is our refuge."

A Presidential Address to the Oxford Diocesan Synod, September 2020 - an edited extract.

We will be rebuilding and regathering as local church communities and schools and chaplaincies and all their associated ministries and this will take time. We will be playing our part in sustaining villages and towns and cities across our Diocese as disciples as well as hospitals and universities and businesses and civic life. Thank you for all you continue to give in so many ways to this process. I'm deeply appreciative of the many signs of grace I have seen in so many different ways over the last six months. I thank God for you.

We are all aware that we begin this work of rebuilding in a season when we are still learning to live with COVID 19. In the coming months we will be dealing with the aftermath of the first wave of the pandemic: bereavement and ongoing sickness for many; emotional and mental illness for others; the economic effects of lockdown; difficulties in families; the effects on the education and well being of children and young people; and the disproportionate effects on some parts of our communities.

But we begin to regather also knowing that the storm is not yet over. There could well be still further serious disruption to the pattern of our lives, the risks of infection continue, especially for those who have been shielding, normal life cannot be restored in so many ways – and we do not yet know or see clearly whether this phase of living with the virus will last for six months or a year or even longer.

How then should we minister and serve our communities and God's world in this next season, in a world in continuing crisis? How can we play our part as disciples and as citizens and play that part together as part of the Church of Jesus Christ?

We all have wisdom to bring to this process and we will need insight from one other. But my starting point for responding to that question is to draw inspiration and our pattern from the humility and gentleness of Christ. I think these are the qualities we will need as disciples and as the Church in this season.

This is the kind of leadership which draws alongside people, which gathers the fragments, which liberates the gifts of others, which does not overwhelm, which listens and waits patiently to see what is emerging.

This is the leadership we will need to exercise in the coming months as Christian disciples and as the church: the leadership of gentleness and tenderness and patience.

Humility will be key as we offer to support local communities and build up our neighbourhoods; as we draw alongside those in debt or financial difficulty; as we seek to support families in stress; as we reach out to the isolated and bereaved; as we share the purpose and the hope that we have found in lesus Christ.

There will need to be a great deal of listening as we explore how best to reopen our churches for services of worship safely again and as we also continue with the online services which have sustained us during the lockdown. In many places this will take time. But I do want to offer encouragement to every benefice now to find ways to re-open for physical services of worship in the coming weeks and as we rebuild our sacramental life. I want to offer encouragement to every Christian disciple to reset their rule of life, giving priority to Sunday worship and to make their way back to Church physically as soon as it is safe and possible to do so.

Over the last few months as I have listened across the Diocese, I have found myself returning again and again, surprisingly actually, to the things I learned during the early years of Fresh Expressions. In forming new congregations for those who are outside the Church, the Church emerges and has to be thought through from first principles, in different contexts and places. The heart of pioneer ministry is tending this continuous reflection and development as the new community emerges by the grace of God in a different culture and context.

As the whole Church emerges into a new normal, in which so much is fluid and continuously changing, every ministry is now a pioneer ministry: leading, supporting and forming church in a new cultural context. This takes time and energy and hope. There are many setbacks along the way – but Christ is with us in the journey.
